"Pro-Life Articles":

Abortion in Young Women and Subsequent Mental Health: Most debates on abortion have centered around ethical, religious and other issues concerning the rights of the unborn child in circumstances of an "unplanned pregnancy". However, a recent study in New Zealand focused on the mental health of young women following an abortion.

The study concluded, "those having an abortion have elevated rates of subsequent mental health problems including depression, anxiety, suicidal behaviors and substance use disorders" (Journal of Child Psychology & Psychiatry).

Advocates of abortion do not like (and invariably ignore) empirical evidence like this. It is not consistent with their rhetoric which often trivializes the expectant mother's life and death decision.

Once again, science supports the pro-life position, including the fact that abortion harms women. The serious mental health implications of abortion is biological fact---not religious dogma!

Pro-Life Articles (continued)

Abortion, Poverty And Social Ills

Prior to 1973, abortion advocates argued that if abortion was legalized, the reduction in "unwanted children" would result in a dramatic reduction in poverty, child abuse and other social ills. This of course never materialized. On the contrary, poverty today is at record levels and child abuse has literally skyrocketed since 1973 (as the value of life has been severely undermined).

Abortion discriminates against the poor.

Margaret Sanger, the founder of International Planned Parenthood, the world's largest abortion provider, was a proponent of eugenics. She believed in eliminating the poor and minority communities in America through contraception and sterilization. For example, she argued in 1922 that "all our problems are the result of overbreeding among the working classes." (Cited by Steve Mosher and Michael W Bird in their review of Margaret Sanger's *The Pivot of Civilisation*).

And today Planned Parenthood continues to target those very communities with abortion services (though they contend that this has nothing to do with eugenics). A very high percentage of Planned Parenthood abortion mills are located in poor and minority communities. It's no wonder that although abortions have decreased in America over the last few years, Planned Parenthood's abortion numbers continue to go up.

Planned Parenthood has argued that abortion is "cost-effective" because "for every \$1.00 spent by government to pay for abortions for poor women, about \$4.00 is saved in public medical and welfare expenditures incurred as a result of an unintended birth." (*Bad Science in the Service of a Lethally Racist Ideology*, Angela Franz. Cited on the nrlc.org website).

The truth is that abortion and the promiscuous society that it encourages results in increased poverty and other social ills. The "sex without consequences" mentality leads to one-parent-families, a breakdown in the family unit and all the adverse social consequences that this entails.

Fetus or Child?

The photo of the small dead "fetus" within a murdered mother, published by an Italian newspaper has made quite an impression in that country. It is usually not politically correct to publish such a photo, but the impact has been significant simply because the reality of abortion was clearly shown: that a so-called fetus is nothing other than a child that has not yet enjoyed the exterior air.

Whoever has studied anatomy and biology, whoever is an expert in human physiology; know very well that there is no material difference between the fetus and the newborn.

Therefore, why on earth is it heinous to kill a newborn but not to kill a fetus? Unless one believes that the filling of the lungs with air has a "magic" effect, capable of transforming the DNA or the individual's conscience!

It is noteworthy that a child who is aborted is referred to as a fetus, but children that come forth prematurely from the maternal womb are called "premature children".

Even more disturbing, it appears that the line between late abortion and active euthanasia is becoming increasingly blurred. For example, The British Royal College of Obstetricians recently asked that doctors be allowed to let seriously disabled newborns die.

We need to pray for all abortionists, but also some doctors who might be tempted to consider their patients as "non-persons" and might become arbitrary executioners of a death sentence, rather than protectors of life.

Deacons on the front line

Stephen was a deacon in the early church. Evidence suggests that both women and men served as deacons in the early church, and Pope Francis recently established an official commission to study the question of the diaconate of women. The word “radical” means going back to “the root,” so if radical change is ahead for the diaconate, it will be deeply rooted in Christian history and tradition. Pray for wise

discernment by all those involved in the commission.

FEAST OF JOHN, APOSTLE, EVANGELIST

Tell him I AM sent you

Each gospel has an emphasis, and John's is the divinity of Christ revealed in signs of service: feeding multitudes, raising Lazarus, forgiving the adulterous woman, turning water into wine, and washing feet like a slave. In John, Jesus often uses the divine name, I AM: in the poetry of vine and branches, the good shepherd, the bread from heaven. Because you are baptized, divinity lives in you as well. As the hustle of the holidays continues, feed, not thousands, but one hungry person; wash someone's feet by volunteering somewhere; be a good shepherd, a mentor to a young person; be a forgiving, divine vessel of joy. Show that love does not die as Christmas Day passes by.

TODAY'S READINGS: *1 John 1:1-4; John 20:1a, 2-8 (697)*. “*What we have heard, what we have seen with our eyes.*”

WEDNESDAY, DECEMBER 28

FEAST OF THE HOLY INNOCENTS, MARTYRS

Martyrs of today

Our Christmas joy is interrupted today. We remember the children who were slaughtered in Bethlehem by King Herod. Such tragedies continue today—pray for all who die daily from violence and neglect. Pope Francis has reminded us many times that these are the martyrs of

today. On this Christmas weekday we must stop and reflect on the fact that even though there may be darkness and a rejection of life, the light of love, the light of Christmas, shines much brighter and scatters hatred and brings about a new world.

TODAY'S READINGS: 1 John 1:5—2:2; Matthew 2:13-18 (698). *"A voice is heard in Ramah, weeping and great mourning, Rachel weeping for her children and refusing to be comforted, because they are no more."*

THURSDAY, DECEMBER 29

MEMORIAL OF THOMAS BECKET, BISHOP, MARTYR

Fight for what's right

We teach kids to stand up to bullies, but how often do we adults do the same? How many times do we ignore hurtful, inappropriate comments to others in person and online? How often do we fail to advocate for those in our city, country, and world who aren't being treated fairly? It's not easy to risk the repercussions of doing the right thing, but we are called to do so nonetheless. [*Love*](#)." We tend to think of that small family as perfect, but we presume, too, that they worked, prayed, and traveled together as many families do today. Although we don't know their daily rituals and routines, we do know that the child of the family became a man of justice and compassion who showed us how to love. To celebrate this Feast of the Holy Family, put love on your lips and in your heart and do something today that imitates the Lord's unconditional love.
